East Lindsey District Council launches consultation on proposed Council Tax Support Scheme for 2027/28

East Lindsey District Council is inviting residents to take part in a public consultation on its proposed Council Tax Support Scheme for 2027/28.

The scheme provides financial help to people on low incomes by reducing the amount of Council Tax they pay.

The Council reviews the scheme for working-age households every year to ensure it remains fair, sustainable and meets the needs of the community.

East Lindsey's CTS scheme is means-tested and offers additional support to vulnerable groups, including people with disabilities and those with caring responsibilities. The Council also continues to provide dedicated support for Disablement Pensioners, War Widows, War Widowers and Care Leavers, with no proposed changes to these groups.

Since April 2025, the scheme has provided up to 85% support for working-age households with children and 50% for those without children. In total, the scheme currently supports around 5,946 working-age households and 5,450 pension-age households, representing an annual cost of approximately £12.7 million.

For the 2027/28 financial year, the Council is proposing to retain the existing scheme, updated in line with the Government's annual uprating of premiums and allowances. This approach aims to maintain stability for the scheme and ensure it remains affordable for the Council.

Pension-age households are not affected by changes to the local scheme, as their entitlement is set nationally by the Government.

Residents are encouraged to share their views on the proposals, with feedback helping to shape the final scheme. This is considered as part of the Council's budget-setting process for the next financial year.

Tougher action available against private landlords who fail to fix dangerous homes

East Lindsey District Council has welcomed an additional power that will help it take tougher action against dangerous housing problems.

Last month, the Government gave councils in England the ability to issue fines of up to £7,000 to private landlords who fail to address serious safety hazards in their properties, including significant damp and mould, fire risks and structural issues.

The fine applies to 21 of the most serious housing hazards that put tenants' health and safety at risk.

The new penalty comes alongside changes to the Housing Health and Safety Rating System (HHSRS), which assesses health and safety risks in rented homes. The updated system makes it easier to identify serious hazards.

Government announces decision on Local Government Reorganisation in Greater Lincolnshire

The Government has today announced its decision on Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) in Greater Lincolnshire.

Subject to legislation being passed, the Government has confirmed the creation of two new unitary authorities: a new unitary for Lincolnshire and a new unitary for North Lincolnshire and North East Lincolnshire. The new unitary authorities will have the potential to combine as one unitary authority in the future.

A unitary council is a single local authority that is responsible for all local government services in an area, including education, social care, highways and transport, waste and recycling, housing, planning, council tax, environmental health, and vulnerable people.

Existing county and district council arrangements will continue during a transition period while detailed implementation arrangements are developed. The new Councils are expected to go live in April 2028.

Today's decision follows the Government's statutory consultation on proposals submitted by councils across Lincolnshire, where they expressed their preferred approach to the future structure of local government.

East Lindsey tourism delivers record £994m economic impact in 2025

A new report has revealed that tourism generated an all-time high of almost £1 billion for the East Lindsey district in 2025, with increases recorded across visitor numbers, visitor spend and tourism-supported jobs.

The latest STEAM (Scarborough Tourism Economic Activity Monitor) results show visitors to East Lindsey generated a record economic impact during 2025, an increase of 13.8% on the previous year and the highest figure ever recorded.

The report found that over 4.76 million people visited East Lindsey over the course of the year, a rise of 1.2% on 2024. Visitors enjoying an overnight stay increased significantly by 12.7% to 1.93 million, while day visitors also increased by 1.1% to 2.83 million.

An increase in visitors also led to an increase in local residents employed in tourism related work, with 6,100 jobs in the district, up 4.7% on the year before.

The positive results were mirrored across both of East Lindsey's key tourism destinations, the coast and the Wolds. The Wolds welcomed 3.62 million visitors and generated £281.96 million in economic impact, while the coast welcomed 2.94 million visitors and £751.89 million in economic impact, both showing significant strong growth compared to 2024.

The results come as the council continues to strengthen its support for the visitor economy through its new Visitor Economy Plan, which sets out a shared vision and long-term strategy to grow tourism sustainably across East Lindsey and the South & East Lincolnshire Councils Partnership sub-region.

The council has also announced further investment in tourism activities and events through the East Lindsey Local Enterprise Fund (ELIF), a £20m fund to improve life for everyone across the district, including by helping communities and businesses to develop projects that attract visitors and support local businesses.

Food waste caddy deliveries have started

Deliveries of new food waste recycling caddies has begun today across East Lindsey.

Ahead of the launch of the district's new weekly food waste recycling service, East Lindsey District Council has delivered new food waste caddies to more than 76,000 households.

Each household will receive:

- a small indoor food waste caddy
- a larger outdoor food waste caddy
- an initial roll of liners
- an information guide explaining how to use the service

Caddies will be delivered to residents' doorsteps or placed within individual properties boundary.

Residents are asked not to begin using the caddies until the week before collections start. Information about the service will be shared closer to the launch of the service.

The smaller indoor caddy should be emptied regularly into the larger outdoor caddy. Residents can line the outdoor caddy with supplied liners or everyday household items such as old bread bags, plastic shopping bags, newspaper or cardboard.

Both caddies can be washed when needed, and the indoor caddy is dishwasher safe up to 60°C.

Food waste collections are due to begin in the Autumn and will take place weekly on the same day as the purple-lidded bin collection. Households should place their larger, orange-lidded outdoor caddy out along with the purple-lidded bin collection.

In collaboration with A&H (www.artsandheritage.org.uk) and Spalding Gentleman's Society, the South & Partnership, through Story Tellers, is launching the next phase of an exciting cultural programme designed to provide creative opportunities to heritage organisations, artists and communities across Lincolnshire.

The Arts in Heritage programme will continue through Story Tellers, the Partnership's Arts Council England building on the success of its first phase and introducing new investment to help strengthen the county's sectors.

'Arts in Heritage' aims to support collaboration between local creative practitioners, heritage sites, organisations and people with heritage stories, traditions or research, to tell tales from across Lincolnshire in new and innovative ways.

The latest phase will support four heritage organisations to commission themselves, four local Artists to create works inspired by Lincolnshire's rich history and places.

Through a programme of workshops, mentoring and peer learning, participating heritage organisations will gain confidence to work with artists and deliver ambitious cultural projects.

Applications for heritage organisations are set to open at the end of July, with artist commission opportunities starting in September.

Delivered in partnership with A&H and Spalding Gentlemen's Society, the programme aims to build lasting local talent and enable more people to connect with Lincolnshire's unique heritage through culture and creativity.

Popular festival of light, art and storytelling returning to Lincolnshire's coast this October

A popular and creative celebration of the East Lindsey and Lincolnshire coastline is returning for a third time with the announcement of Lightwaves: Lumens of the Lost.

Organised by Story Tellers, South & East Lincolnshire Councils Partnership's Arts Council England funded programme will bring together an ambitious programme of creative experiences that will transform parts of East Lindsey through storytelling, heritage and community participation.

Taking place across Spilsby, Chapel St Leonards, Sandilands and Sutton-on-Sea, the expanded festival will run from:

- Spilsby - Saturday 10th October
- Chapel St Leonards - Thursday 15th October
- Sandilands - Saturday 17th October
- Sutton on Sea - Saturday 24th October

Through immersive light installations, sound, storytelling and participatory activities, Lightwaves will invite visitors to explore the landscapes, memories and myths that define the Lincolnshire coast, using the area's remarkable changing shoreline to explore how places can hold memory, evolve, disappear and be continually reimagined.

As well as celebrating East Lindsey's rich coastal heritage, the programme will also be encouraging communities to reflect on environmental change, local folklore and the enduring relationship between land, sea and people.

Developed by Story Tellers in collaboration with creative partners Sessions Arts and a new artist commissioning programme has been designed to place local communities at its heart. A series of workshops and engaging activities for residents of all ages to share their stories, memories and lived experiences to help shape the final art installation.

Each night will be entirely unique, forming a connected narrative that will come together in a finale event together the stories, creativity and experiences gathered throughout the programme.

East Lindsey District Council approves plans for latest phase of £20m Investment Fund for local communities

East Lindsey District Council has given the go-ahead for ambitious plans for the second phase of the £20m Investment Fund (ELIF).

The decision, made by the council's Executive Board on Wednesday 1 July 2026, represents an unprecedented commitment to support local communities, with funding coming directly from the authority's own funds.

The East Lindsey Investment Fund (ELIF 1) was launched in September 2024, when the council allocated £10m to support projects across the district.

Over the past two years, ELIF 1 has delivered ambitious projects across coastal communities, market town, and rural areas, focusing on its four key priorities of community development, pride in place, tourism and events, and business support.

Following the success of this scheme, the council allocated a further £10m for the second phase (ELIF 2) in its 2026-27 budget. Executive Board was updated on the impact of the scheme so far, as well as approving the second phase, releasing £10m to support transformational projects, community initiatives and economic development.

Story Tellers secures Arts Council funding extension to March 2028

The South and East Lincolnshire Councils Partnership's Story Tellers programme has secured a further year of National Portfolio Organisation (NPO) funding from Arts Council England, extending their support for arts, culture and creative communities to March 2028.

It was recently confirmed that the project would be part of the 2027/28 National Portfolio Extension, providing investment to build on the success of Story Tellers and continue to bring high-quality cultural opportunities to communities across Boston Borough, East Lindsey and South Holland.

The announcement marks another important milestone for a programme that has grown significantly since 2023, securing an initial £1.95 million of investment. Since then, Story Tellers has helped deliver a wide range of projects, training and funding, celebrating the area's unique heritage, stories and communities.

Through festivals, performances, community-led projects, heritage programmes, artist development and experiences, Story Tellers has brought tens of thousands of residents and visitors together to demonstrate and connect people, support local pride and create new opportunities, whilst uncovering and sharing the unique stories of the area.

The months ahead will see further work with partners MBD and Session Arts on the pioneering Infinite M reality experience capturing and preserving local stories. Popular events like Lightwaves and Illuminate will continue to be new ways and building on their previous success to be bigger and better than ever. Another unforgettable event is planned at Ayscoughfee Hall in early 2027, delivered with partners Squid Soup and Chainbridge Forge.

Entirely new initiatives will also be announced soon based on the learnings and community engagement from the programme, bringing exciting activities, workshops and creative partners to the county for the first time. Story Tellers will continue to work with Paradigm Arts and the Young Journalist Academy to support their fantastic programme, as well as the Lincolnshire Heritage, which provides vital investment and creative opportunities to heritage organisations, artists and communities across Lincolnshire.

A third Cultural Conference is also planned for next year to connect local organisations together, along with working in partnership with Paradigm Arts and the Young Journalist Academy to support their fantastic work, and the new funding bringing new investment and creative opportunities to heritage organisations, artists and communities across the county.

Heating Oil Support in East Lindsey

Eligible East Lindsey residents can get help with the rising cost of domestic heating oil. The Crisis and Resilience Fund: Heating Oil Support Scheme, established by Lincolnshire County Council and Lincolnshire Community Foundation.

Many homes in East Lindsey rely on oil for heating, which is not covered by energy price protections and payments. This fund provides targeted assistance to help ensure the most vulnerable residents can continue to access hot water.

To be eligible, you must live in East Lindsey and must:

- Have low income (under £36,000 combined for household)
- Have savings of less than £6,000
- Not be on a mains gas supply and utilise heating oil as the primary fuel for heating and/or hot water
- Be at risk of losing immediate access to heating or hot water due to a lack of heating oil
- Be able to pay the difference between the vouchers value (£300) and the cost of the heating oil including delivery

UKSPF GRASSroots Grant Scheme

A continuation of the popular grant scheme, which has been funded by UKSPF and REPF, which has already funded 100 projects across South & East Lincolnshire.

This scheme provides opportunities for organisations to deliver projects that bring people together and improve community connectivity or long-term sustainability and resilience of community organisations across South & East Lincolnshire. Grants of up to a maximum of £24,999 available.

Grants4Growth will continue to support local businesses to invest in their future awarding both capital and grants to Medium Sized Enterprises (SMEs) in the SELCP area looking to grow.

Advice4Growth provides access to a team of Business Advisors who are able to help businesses overcome growth opportunities and achieve growth objectives.

East Coast Community Fund

The East Coast Community Fund is part of the community engagement programme for Ørsted's Race Bank wind farms which are located off the Yorkshire and Lincolnshire coast. To be eligible to apply for a grant, you must be for the benefit of communities, within the funding area.

Building a Safer, More Prepared Lincolnshire

Lincolnshire faces a variety of local risks from flooding and severe weather to power outages and unexpected events. To help communities be better prepared the Lincolnshire Resilience Forum is encouraging parish and town councils to work together to build resilience.

- Give a description of the person, such as clothes, hair colour/length, facial hair, accent, height
- If a person is rough sleeping in a vehicle, providing the registration number, make, model and location, is helpful.
